In--preposition + ablative (place where)

somnīs--ablative, plural, masculine; object of *in*

ecce--interjection

ante--preposition + accusative

oculōs--accusative, plural, masculine; object of *ante*

maestissimus--nominative, singular, masculine; superlative adj. modifying *Hector*

Hector--nominative, singular, masculine; subject of main clause

vīsus [est]--3rd person, singular, perfect, passive, indicative; verb of main clause

adesse--present, active, infinitive; complementary infinitive with *vīsus [est]*

mihī--dative, singular, masculine; dat. of reference (refers to Aeneas)

largōs--accusative, plural, masculine; positive adj. modifying *flētūs*

-que--enclitic conjunction connecting *adesse* and *effundere*

effundere-- present, active, infinitive; complementary infinitive with *vīsus [est]*

flētūs-- accusative, plural, masculine; direct object of *effundere*

raptātus--nominative, singular, masculine, perfect, passive; participle modifying *Hector*

bīgīs--ablative, plural, feminine; ablative of means

ut--conjunction

quondam--adverb [note that you need to add *Hector erat* for this clause to make sense]

āter-- nominative, singular, masculine; positive adj. modifying *Hector*

-que--enclitic conjunction connecting *raptātus* and *āter*

cruentō--ablative, singular, neuter; positive adj. modifying *pulvere*

pulvere--ablative, singular, neuter; ablative of cause, means, or description

per--preposition + accusative

-que--enclitic conjunction connecting *āter* and *trāiectus*

pedēs--accusative, plural, masculine; object of *per*

trāiectus--nominative, singular, masculine, perfect, passive=Grk middle; participle mod. *Hector*

lōra--accusative, plural, neuter; direct object of *trāiectus* aka Greek accusative

tumentēs-- accusative, plural, masculine, present, active; participle modifying *pedēs*
