

Latin I Syllabus (2009-2010)

I. Course Description

This class will introduce students to the Latin language and the ancient Roman world. Students will study and practice using the written grammatical structure of classical Latin as preparation for reading and discussing Latin literature written by ancient Roman authors. Students will study Latin vocabulary and English derivatives to help achieve this goal and improve their command of the English language. As part of this class, students will also study Greek and Roman mythology and the culture of the Romans. This is a Core 40/Academic Honors Diploma course.

II. Objectives

To learn the fundamental structure, usefulness, and beauty of the Latin language through the study of its grammar, vocabulary, and literature. To develop an appreciation of the Classical tradition through the study of the Latin language, Roman history, literature, and mythology.

IV. Student Responsibilities

- **Be Prepared:** Bring your textbook, a pen and a pencil, loose-leaf paper, and a three-ring binder. The three-ring binder helps you improve your organizational and note-taking skills and will be count as a test each grading period.
- **Be On Time:** If you must come in late, sign in on the clipboard and try not to disrupt the class.
- **Be In Class:** Attendance is very important in a sequential class like Latin. When you are absent, you are missing practice that cannot be replaced or

reproduced. See me to discuss extended absences for documented medical reasons.

- **Be a Productive Team Member:** I expect you as a student to:
 - ✓ accept responsibility (and consequences) for your actions.
 - ✓ ask questions whenever you do not understand something and get help when you need it.
 - ✓ treat everyone in our classroom with respect and courtesy.
 - ✓ remember that what comes easily to some is more difficult for others.
 - ✓ participate actively and positively throughout the entire period.
 - ✓ throw your gum in the trash when you enter the room.
- **Avoid Consequences:** If you choose to break school rules or ignore my expectations, I will choose from the following consequences:
 - ✓ give you a warning.
 - ✓ call home to discuss your behavior and possible solutions.
 - ✓ assign you a personal detention after school at my convenience.
 - ✓ refer you to the appropriate assistant principal.

V. Grades

A. Your grade is a combination of homework, class participation, and tests. Expect to participate daily, have homework each night, and take 1-5 tests per six weeks (including the six weeks assessment (SWA)). Class Participation and Homework are practice for the tests; if you skip parts of this practice, you are making success harder to attain.

B. Each grade category is a weighted portion of the six weeks grade:

Homework Average	20%
Participation Average	10%
Test Average	49.5% (70%=3 rd & 6 th)
SWA Average	20.5% (0%=3 rd & 6 th)

1. Homework, worth 2 points, will be graded on completeness and will be corrected in

class. **If you earn one point or less two days in a row, you will be assigned a one-hour detention after school in my room to be served within a week.** Absent students should turn in all work missed when they return in order to receive credit. Homework for each week is listed in the classroom and on-line (see contact info).

2. Tests and SWAs are usually between 25-100 points each.

C. To determine your grade, take the number of Homework points scored and divide by the number of possible Homework points then multiply by .20. Repeat this process for each category then add these numbers together. This will be your grade for the six weeks. You will be responsible for recording your grades on the provided sheet and keeping it in your binder. If your coaches need me to verify your scores, I will be happy to provide a printed grade report **24 hours after you hand me a written request.** Your parents can access your grades on-line. Graded assessments are usually posted within one week of due date, but some items take longer to grade.

D. The following grading scale will be used for the six weeks and final grades:

Percentages will be rounded to the nearest whole number when determining grades.

E. Each six weeks is worth 26.5% of your final grade; the semester exam contributes the other 20.5%. Your semester average will be determined by applying the weights to each of these four averages and adding the results.

VI. Make-up Work: Homework that was due while absent should be turned in when you return. You will get credit for the homework that is due the day you return if you do it with the class. Smaller assessments should be made up during Zero Period as soon as possible. Larger assessments must be made up after school as soon as possible. You should try not to miss any assessments. If you are having problems getting your make-up work done, please talk to me. The deadline for doing make-up work is the last day of the six weeks.

VII. Help: I believe that **all** of my students **can** be successful, and I will do my part to help you succeed, but you must work with me to make that happen. Don't be afraid to ask questions; if you won't ask in front of the class, ask me later.

AM: Please get help from me during Zero Period (7:00-7:20 M, T, Th, F).

PM: I'm usually here **a lot** after school. Try to ask a day in advance since my meeting schedule varies, but don't be afraid to just stop by and see if I'm in either. I'm really very approachable one on one so please ask for help.

E-Mail & Phone: Since I'm usually at school late, try calling here first (see contact info). If you can't reach me here, my home phone number is (219) 661-9154 (see contact info for e-mail address). Please use this information responsibly.

Tutors: I maintain a list of students who are willing to tutor other students in Latin. Please see me for a copy of this list.
